- **1947** The University of Michigan opens its Center for Japanese Studies.
- **1948** The Far Eastern Library (later Asia Library) is established as part of the University of Michigan Library.
- **1950** The Kamada Collection is acquired from the Kamada Library in Kagawa Prefecture, Japan.
- **1961** The Center for Chinese Studies (now the Lieberthal-Rogel Center for Chinese Studies) is established.
- **1965** Asia Library receives the papers of Commander Alfred Rodman Hussey, documenting the rewriting of the postwar Japanese constitution.
- **1969** Weiying Wan becomes head of Asia Library, a position he will occupy until his retirement in 2003.
- **1978** G.K. Hall & Co. publishes the 25-volume Catalogs of the Asia Library, placing the collection among the top East Asian libraries in the United States.
- **1995** The Nam Center for Korean Studies is established.
- 2000 The first Korean studies librarian is hired.
- **2003** Asia Library becomes the tenth member of the Korean Collection Consortium of North America (KCCNA).
- **2015** Mushi no Utaawase emaki, a rare scroll from Edo-period (1600-1868) Japan, is acquired.
- **2017** The library mounts an exhibition featuring resources from its special collection on the history of Chinese dance, the largest of its kind outside China.
- **2018** The Nam Center for Korean Studies donates to Asia Library twenty framed photographs of South Korea in 1969, taken by then Peace Corps volunteer Margaret Condon Taylor.
